## Live Like a Local While on Vacation



Whether you're seeking spectacular local dishes, special events, pristine beaches or surprising local peculiarities, you're bound to find something on Pensacola Beach that really "floats your boat." Just ask an islander about their favorites or explore with a fellow traveler to discover the personality of paradise. Following are a few bits of island trivia to get you started:

- Island cuisine ranges from famous burgers, beach pizza and wings to Cuban sandwiches, steaks and a wide variety of fresh-from-the-gulf specialties. In fact, oysters lovers are drawn to the island where one popular restaurant serves up more than 1.3 million oysters each year, which equates to about 253 tons of the tasty treats on the half shell.
- Prepare to lunge, laugh and love the simplicity of summer nights while hunting for ghost crabs. Just grab a flashlight and a bucket and look for these quick little critters, often seen scurrying along the shoreline at speeds up to 10 mph. Always use a gentle hand and observe only briefly before setting them free.
- Santa Rosa Island is a prolific herb garden—a native mint, Conradina, looks similar to rosemary and is easily spotted on the island's western end near Fort Pickens. Other edible plants include muscadine grapes, wild onions and dewberries.
- It's true, the beach squeaks. Quartz that eroded in the Appalachian Mountains eons ago slowly made its way down rivers and streams to the gulf and Pensacola Beach. The fine grains of white sand actually squeak when you walk barefoot, something locals call our "singing sand."
- A trip to the island is not complete without trying a Bushwacker, the island's signature drink. Developed by a local business owner in 1975, the rum-based drink is a rich, creamy, chocolately concoction that now comes in strawberry or banana versions. For non-drinkers, the "virgin" Bushwacker can be made sans alcohol.
